AS-T – Business Administration 2.0

About the Degree

The Associates in Science in Business Administration 2.0 for Transfer is based on the state-wide Transfer Model Curriculum for Business and prepares students for seamless transfer into the CSU system to complete a baccalaureate degree in Business Administration or similar major. After completing the required courses in this program students will graduate with a broad-based understanding of the field of business, its demands, required skill-sets, needed abilities, and career opportunities.

Completion Requirements:

- Completion of 60 semester units or 90 quarter units that are eligible for transfer to the California State University, including both of the following:
 - The Intersegmental General Education Transfer Curriculum (IGETC) or CA State University General Education – Breadth Requirements.
 - A minimum of 18 semester units or 27 quarter units in a major or area of emphasis, as determined by the community college district.
- Obtainment of a minimum grade point average of 2.0.

**Certificate of Achievement – Reddaway
Heavy Truck Driving Academy**

About the Degree

The Reddaway Heavy Truck Driving Academy Certificate of Achievement can provide the skills necessary for an apprentice to qualify as trained entry-level truck drivers, as well as for career advancement. The Reddaway Truck Driving Academy is a 7-week apprenticeship program that trains employees using classroom instruction, range and road driving, and practical application of skills used in the operation of a tractor/trailer. Students completing the program will have a hazmat endorsement and be eligible to sit for the Class A Commercial Driver’s License. Students will also receive training in the Smith Safety System by certified instructors and forklift operation. This program includes a work experience component.

Completion of the required courses for the certificate with a grade point average of 2.0 or higher and complete at least (50%) of the required program at Las Positas College (or Chabot College).

**AA-T – Social Justice Studies:
Women and Gender Studies**

About the Degree

The AA-T in Social Justice Studies: Gender Studies is designed for prospective California State University (CSU) transfer students who are preparing for careers in Women and Gender Studies and related fields. Completion of the Social Justice Studies: Gender Studies Transfer degree will provide a streamlined pathway for transfer to a CSU campus with a Women and Gender Studies or similar major. Examples of CSU majors include American Studies, Gender Studies, Liberal Studies w/ Option in Interdisciplinary Studies in Culture & Society, Sociology - Concentration in Race, Class, and Gender, Sociology with Inequalities and Diversity Option, Women, Gender, and Sexuality Studies, and Women's Studies. Students should consult with a counselor to determine whether or not this degree is the best option for their transfer goals. GE requirements should be selected carefully based on the intended transfer institution; please see a counselor for details if you are pursuing transfer to the UC system.

Completion Requirements:

1. Completion of 60 semester units or 90 quarter units that are eligible for transfer to the California State University, including both of the following:
 - a. The Intersegmental General Education Transfer Curriculum (IGETC) or CA State University General Education – Breadth Requirements.
 - b. A minimum of 18 semester units or 27 quarter units in a major or area of emphasis, as determined by the community college district.
2. Obtainment of a minimum grade point average of 2.0.

Certificate of Completion - Drone Photography, Mapping, and Piloting

About the Degree

Las Positas College offers short-term, tuition free, and noncredit courses in the safe operation of drones and Unoccupied Aerial Systems (UAVs). A certificate focuses on mission planning, basic flight operations, and the legal framework (local, state, and federal). These courses are open to all with no prerequisite experience or equipment and are geared more toward gaining direct user experience. This is a creative starting point to using drones in multiple disciplines and careers.

Completion Requirements:

A Certificate of Completion is a noncredit certificate intended for students who do not need credit for transfer but who wish to obtain the knowledge and preparation of skills needed for entry level positions in the workforce or obtain short-term vocational skills needed for immediate employment. The Certificate of Completion is awarded those students who successfully complete the required courses for the certificate.

Upon completion of the Vocational ESL: Retail program, students will be prepared for workforce entry and provided the opportunity to interview with LPC retail partners.

Q What is the California State University General Education-Breadth (CSUGE-B)		
A CSUGE-B is a general education pattern which community college transfer students can follow to fulfill lower-division general education requirements for the CSU systems.		
Q Is CSUGE-B an admission requirement?		
A NO. If appropriate for the major, students may complete the minimum eligibility requirements for admission to a CSU – see a counselor for details and advisement.		
Q Can I use Advanced Placement (AP), International Baccalaureate (IB), and College Level Examination Program (CLEP) exams for CSUGE-B?		
A YES. AP, IB, and CLEP exams may be applied to CSUGE-B with passing scores. For details, see the AP, IB, and CLEP Charts in the LPC Catalog. However, application of AP, IB, and CLEP exams to major requirements can vary at each CSU campus.		
Q What is "CSUGE-B Certification" and how do I request it?		
A CSUGE-B certification is the process by which the community college verifies that a student has completed all of the required coursework for the CSUGE-B pattern (39 units and partial completion is possible), which is sent directly to the transfer institution. If CSUGE-B is not certified, students may be subject to the lower-division GE requirements of the campus to which they transfer. Request a CSUGE-B Certification in the Admissions & Records Office at the end of the last semester before transferring.		
Please note that Las Positas and Chabot College DO NOT share CSUGE-B or IGETC patterns. If you are interested in taking a course at Chabot College please be sure to see a counselor.

FAQS: Frequency Asked Questions about IGETC

Q What is the Intersegmental General Education Transfer Curriculum (IGETC)

A IGETC is a general education pattern which community college transfer students can follow to fulfill lower-division general education requirements for either the UC or CSU systems. This pattern is advisable for students who are undecided about their transfer goals because it keeps their options open. Many private/independent colleges/universities also recognize or accept IGETC (see a counselor for details).

Q Is IGETC an admission requirement?

A NO. There is no connection between completion of IGETC and eligibility for admission to the CSU or UC system.

Q What alternatives to IGETC exist?

A Community college students who are CSU-bound have the option to complete the CSU General Education Breadth requirements. Students who are UC-bound have the option of completing the general education requirements of the destination UC campus or the minimum UC transfer admission requirements as listed on ASSIST.org > select Las Positas College and UC Transfer Admission Eligibility Courses.

Q Is it advisable for all transfer students to follow IGETC?

A No. Not all majors should follow IGETC. Students pursuing majors that require extensive lower-division major preparation (i.e. Engineering) may not find IGETC advantageous, and the transfer institution may advise following the minimum UC eligibility requirements listed on ASSIST.org > select Las Positas College and UC Transfer Admission Eligibility Courses.

Q Can I use Advanced Placement (AP) and International Baccalaureate (IB) exams for IGETC?

A YES. AP and IB exams may be applied to IGETC with passing scores. For details, see the AP and IB Charts in the LPC Catalog. However, application of AP and IB exams to major requirements can vary at each UC campus.

Q What is "IGETC Certification" and how do I request it?

A IGETC certification is the process by which the community college verifies that a student has completed all of the required coursework for the IGETC pattern (11 courses/34 units where Area 1C is not required and partial completion is also possible), which is sent directly to the transfer institution. If IGETC is not certified, students may be subject to the lower-division general education requirements of the campus to which they transfer. Request an IGETC Certification in the Admissions & Records at the end of the last semester before transferring.

Please note that Las Positas and Chabot College DO NOT share CSUGE-B or IGETC patterns. If you are interested in taking a course at Chabot College please be sure to see a counselor.
