The Anthropology program currently offers 11 lecture and 2 laboratory courses. The majority of these are in IGETC Area 4 (Social Science) and three in Area 5 (Biological Science). Three courses comprise our core for the anthropology AA-T and each represent the three sub-disciplines: ANTR 1 Biological Anthropology, ANTR 2 Archaeology, and ANTR 3 Cultural Anthropology.

In addition to these, each semester we offer sections of ANTR 13 Forensic anthropology, ANTR 12 Magic Religion Witchcraft and Healing, and ANTR 1L Biological Anthropology Lab. The remaining courses are offered on three-year rotation and are sub-discipline specific: ANTR 2 L Archaeology Field Lab, ANTR 4 Language and Culture, ANTR 6 Anthropology of Sex and Gender, and ANTR 8 World Prehistory in an Archaeological Perspective.

For each of the sub-disciplines, we offer Independent Studies ANTR 29A, 29B, and 29C with variable units (0.5-2 units). These courses are an opportunity for students to focus and develop their interests.

All Anthropology courses meet the requirements for General Education. Anthropology majors take three core and three ancillary courses to form the base of an Associate in Arts in Anthropology for Transfer degree.

Students tend to choose courses leaning towards one or two of the three sub-disciplines (Biological, Cultural, Archaeology). Each sub-discipline instills unique skill sets; archaeology is orientated similar to other physical science field studies, biological tends to be laboratory based, and cultural anthropology models other social sciences. These distinctions means that archaeology and biological anthropology emphasize laboratory based methods within a dedicated indoor and/or outdoor lab. In contrast, cultural anthropology students are directed to gain project-based training in SOC 13 or PSYC 25 Research Methods.

To meet the needs of the physical science component, the anthropology department maintains an anthropology laboratory in Building 1000. It houses a growing collection of teaching materials and equipment to maintain a high level of academic rigor. We also manage a portion of a shipping container located on the upper athletic field for storing outdoor field equipment. Every two years we have run archaeological field methods classes, usually in the Spring, where students learn fundamental excavation, survey, and laboratory techniques. Our lecture classes are capped at 44 and our lab classes are set at 24. We offer nearly a third of our courses as DE with three hybrid sections each semester.

Anthropology is a broadly positioned Liberal Arts education that collaborates within the social and biological sciences. Many programs list anthropology as List A courses, for example, Global Studies lists ANTR 3 Cultural Anthropology as an option.

Our largest number of classes are focused in Biological Anthropology. These courses provide additional options for students in the Biological and Social Sciences Intersegmental General Education Transfer Curriculum (IGETC) pattern. Over two-thirds of our courses are related to Biological Science and are mirrored as lab-based courses to meet the biological laboratory requirement.

It should be stressed that anthropology majors are being employed at higher rates in archaeology than the other sub-disciplines. A student with field training and an AA degree is employable with Cultural Resource Management and Environmental Firms as an "Archaeological Field Technician." Currently, the anthropology program collaborates with other community colleges to help field train students in excavation, survey, and laboratory methods. These spring/summer field training courses (termed Field Schools) require a significant commitment of labor and time. The re-establishment of two faculty members would assure that these types of hands-on field methods opportunities remain, and these career paths are not neglected.

As mentioned above, the anthropology program is represented by three mutually supportive disciplines; archaeology, biological, and cultural anthropology.
