LPC Celebrates 40th Anniversary with April 17 Open House and Ribbon Cutting Ceremony

The year was 1975. President Gerald R. Ford was in the White House. Americans were dancing “the hustle” and watching their favorite television show, *All in the Family*. Tech pioneers built their own personal computers with the new Altair home computer kit. And, on March 31st, 1975, the Tri-Valley welcomed its new college—the Chabot College Valley Campus, later to become Las Positas College.

This year, we celebrate 40 years of providing excellence in higher education to our community. To commemorate this milestone, LPC is holding an Open House and Ribbon Cutting Ceremony on April 17th. A short program, “LPC Through the Years,” will begin the day’s events from 1:00 to 1:30 p.m. in the Mertes Center, Building 4000.

The ribbon cutting celebrates the newly-renovated Library and Veteran’s Center. It will begin at 2:30 p.m. in front of the Library, Building 2000. Campus tours will be offered

until 4:00 p.m. The public is invited to all events; parking is complimentary.

During this anniversary year, LPC has much to celebrate: the recent renovations; our growth as a premier California

community college; our many alumni; our faculty, staff, and administrators who dedicate themselves each day to student success; the citizens of our community who value and support the college; and all of the students whose lives have been transformed at LPC.

We also celebrate the transformation of LPC’s 147-acre

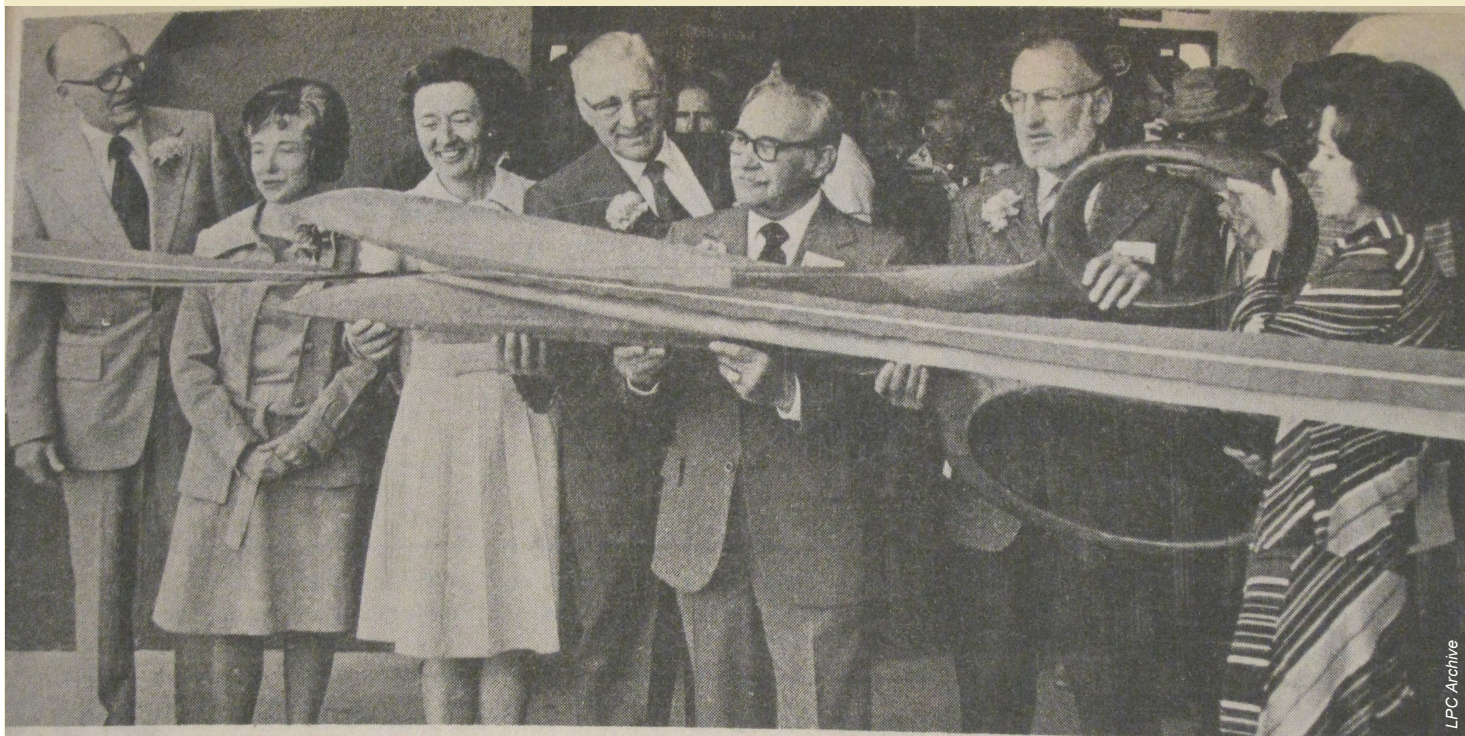

Article Describes College's First Days and Events Leading to the Creation of a New Campus



Valley campus opens

Chabot College Opens Livermore- Amador Valley

Leading educators from everywhere in Alameda County attended Monday's official opening of Chabot College's new Livermore-Amador Valley campus.

First classes began immediately after the ribbon-cutting ceremony.

The initial \$1.3 million facility amid verdant hills northwest of Livermore, 3033 Collier Canyon Road, was opened first day of Spring Quarter.

Board of Trustees of South County Community College District (who spent 12 years in preparing to make the campus a reality) helped cut the ribbon.

Attending were: Ann H. Duncan (Hayward) President; E.J. "Jay" Chinn (San Leandro) Secretary; Ted Jarvis (Castro Valley); Fred M. Duman (Hayward); Mrs. Dorothy Hudgins (Livermore); and L. Arthur Van Effen (San Lorenzo).

500 day students are already studying on the campus. A fifth building will be completed next September, when the campus will be able to accommodate between 900 and 1,000 day students. Evening classes will also be held in the new facility.

Chabot College officials participating in the new campus opening were Dr. Reed L. Bufington (Superintendent-President), Peter A. Barthelme (Business Manager), Dr. Richard D. Yeo (Dean of Instruction), Dr. Arthur L. Larson (Dean of Student Personnel), John R. McKinley (Dean of Administrative Services), and Dr. Barbara Mertes (Dean of Chabot College-Valley Campus).

Opening ceremonies began with a welcome by Ann H. Duncan, Hayward, President, Board of Trustees of South County Community College District. Then she introduced the dignitaries.

Livermore's new campus includes a Learning Resource Center, Reading and Writing Laboratories, Secretarial Science Laboratory, five classrooms each seating 50 students, a science center with laboratories for chemistry, biology, and physics, a turf area for physical education classes, and offices for counselors and faculty members.

A staff of 40 - 15 instructors, 20 non-teaching personnel, four administrators - is headed by Dr. Barbara F. Mertes, Livermore native and daughter of the Charles Francisco Livermore. She is wife of Dr. David Mertes, president of College of San Mateo.

Faculty members are: Jerry Ball (mathematics), Roy Bidwell (biology), Joe Downs (history), Marshall Drummond (business), Esther Goldberg (political science), Jack Healey (chemistry), Dr. Henry Hoey

(psychology) and Maurice Ngo (mathematics).

Ellen Owen (English), Maria Chavez Pollinen (humanities), Dr. Judith Porta (sociology), Sophie Che Rheinheimer (physical education), Dee Ann Roshong (counseling), George Ann Tow (counseling), Dr. Bruce Werner (physical education) and David Wright (English).

Valley campus was forecast back in 1962 when a "Master Plan" was developed by Odell MacConnell Associates, Palo Alto.

Livermore-Amador Valley annexed to the South County college district October 2nd, 1962, becoming effective the following July 1st.

Present site (147 acres) was purchased for \$397,538, January 5, 1965, with part proceeds from a 1963 bond issue which also was used to build Chabot College in Hayward.

Tax override proposals were placed on the ballot to build a college in the Valley in 1970 and 1972. Both proposals carried in the Valley, but were defeated by voters on the Bay side.

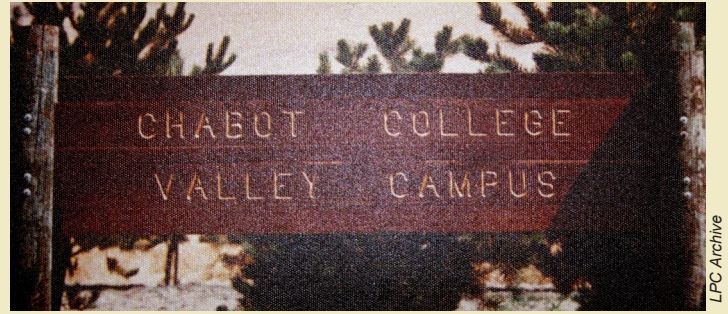
The Board of Trustees voted May 7th, 1974, to proceed with construction of a smaller campus, and May 21st awarded a contract for the first 4 buildings to Robert D. Moore Construction Company, (Burlingame).

Soon a fifth building will be constructed by C.A. Gossett and Sons, Castro Valley.

Architects Delp W. Johnson, Pool and Strom, San Francisco, described the architecture as contemporary design, based on Spanish tradition.

Distinctive College Gets a New Name and Status

An inaugural message below by Founding Dean Barbara F. Mertes, Ph.D., hints at the destiny of the new college. Just as the founders envisioned, LPC, indeed, has become a “distinctive” college—a first choice for many area high school graduates and a valued source of skilled professionals by area employers. It also got a new name—inspired by Rancho Las Positas, the land grant of Tri-Valley settler Robert Livermore—and, in 1988, it was designated by the Board of Governors as an independent college.



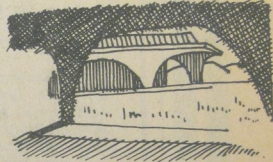
Original Campus Sign
