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LPC Leads the Way with New Placement Methods, Increasing Chances of Success and Transfer

Instructor Jim Ott teaches a transfer-level English 1A class. By implementing new placement methods this semester, LPC is providing greater access to transfer-level English classes—ensuring that more students reach their potential and academic goals.

Thanks to LPC's innovations in English course placement methods, students have a greater chance of success for transferring and earning certificates and degrees. LPC has adopted new placement methods that give increased weight to high school GPA, which is proven to correlate with success in college English courses.

As a result, student placement into transfer-level English 1A classes increased from 35 percent in fall 2015 to 78 percent for fall 2016—more than doubling the percentage of students placed in transfer-level English, saving students save time and money, and helping students reach their educational goals faster. Results at other colleges implementing the new placement method show that students are succeeding in the transfer-level classes. At LPC, English instructors report that they are not noticing a change in the preparedness of English 1A students.

English faculty members emphasize that classes maintain their high standards and academic rigor. "This placement change does not represent a lowering of standards in any way," said English Instructor Karin Spirn. "English 1A grading standards remain unchanged." Faculty in LPC's Math Program are planning similar innovations in placement methods.

Currently, many California community colleges are adopting placement improvements and a new methodology is being developed for the statewide system.

Students Gain Leadership Skills at Conference

LPC students gained valuable leadership training and staff learned more about supporting student success in STEM (science, technology, engineering, and math) at the recent annual conference of Hispanic Association of Colleges and Universities. This training was made possible through Gateway to STEM Success, a \$2.3 million grant awarded to LPC last year by the U.S. Department of Education. The grant ensures that high-need students, regardless of race or socio-economic condition, get the support they need to be successful in remedial basic math and STEM prerequisite courses. LPC was eligible to apply for the grant because of our status as a Hispanic Serving Institution (HSI).

LPC Listens to Students Sharing Challenges

One transfer student said he was afraid to go to college because, as a youngster, he was called “stupid.” At LPC, he enrolled in Learning Skills classes taught by Learning Disability Specialist Paula Schoenecker, who asked if he had ever been tested for learning disabilities. He had not. After testing at LPC, the student said he realized he was not “stupid”—he simply learned differently. With support from his instructors, counselors, and the Disability Resource Center, he thrived at LPC and succeeded in transferring to California State University, Stanislaus. The LPC community thanks this courageous student and others like him who shared personal accounts about their struggles and success at the October 27 panel presentation, *Are You Listening? Stories from Students with Learning Challenges*. We applaud their

perseverance and positive attitude, embodied in one student’s comment: “I don’t see myself as handicapped, but ‘handicapable’.” LPC values the education they provided to our community.

Student panelists praised the many LPC programs, instructors, and counselors who support their success, including Ms. Schoenecker, Alternate Media/Assistive Technology Specialist Karen Zeigler, and the Tutorial Center. The College Student Resources (CSR) Club sponsored the event in connection with National Disability Awareness Month and National Bullying Prevention Month. English Instructor and CSR Club Advisor Marty Nash and Co-Advisors Ms. Schoenecker and Ms. Zeigler helped make the presentation possible.

Students Explore Public Safety Careers at Fair

Aspiring firefighters, police officers, and paramedics met with area employers and learned about career opportunities at LPC’s October 19 Public Safety Majors Fair. There to visit with students were representatives from more than 20 agencies, including county and city police and fire departments, California Highway Patrol, and private ambulance companies. Open to LPC students and area high school students, the fair was sponsored by LPC’s highly-regarded Public Safety Programs: Administration of Justice, Paramedic/Emergency Medical Services, and Fire Service Technology. All programs have strong ties with local agencies.
