LPC Participates in Delegation as City of Livermore is Named 2021 All-America City



The City of Livermore was named a 2021 All-American City at the National Civic League's All America City Awards Ceremony on June 9, 2021. The delegation was comprised of students, community members, and staff from the City of Livermore, the Livermore Valley Joint Unified School District (LVJUSD), Las Positas College (LPC), and the Livermore Area Recreation and Park District (LARPD). The theme of this year's competition was "Building Equitable and Resilient Communities." LPC interim Dean Erick Bell outlined LPC's new Law Enforcement certificate which focuses on crisis intervention, bias awareness, mental health issues, and situational decision making. In a statement to the City of Livermore, College President Dyrell Foster said, "Las Positas College is committed to continuing to further our mission to provide an inclusive, equity-focused environment by addressing inequities and increasing opportunities for success for all of our students. Our new curriculum focused on 21st Century Policing has benefitted from an outstanding collaborative effort with the Livermore City Council and Police Department."

Las Positas College's very own Nadiyah Taylor, Coordinator for the Early Care and Education Program has written an article in this month's issue of "*Child Care Exchange Magazine*" titled, <u>"*Centering Blackness is an Act of Love.*"</u> It's part of the Magazine's

Reimagining Our Work series.

Centering Blackness Is...

...an act of love.

...not reverse racism.

...an invitation to build upon the experiences of Black children, families, teachers, site supervisors, directors, and administrators.

...an invitation to look deeply at why there are not Black people in any of the spaces where we are missing.

...an invitation to step back and listen to the everyday lived experiences of a community.

...an invitation to build trust.

...an invitation to acknowledge that our field, like many others, is pushed ahead and buoyed by the work of Black and brown people.

...about using the wisdom of Black people, to put equity into action.

In an earlier email she expressed the following as it relates to her article, "As you may remember, last July I sent out information related to all of the racial events that took place last summer, and of course, we've only seen more and more evidence of racism and trauma as the year progressed. I asked us all to think about how we



might respond to these incidents with a new call to action. Last fall I wrote an article for that.

My goal for next year would be for us all to work together to see how we all can deepen our daily practices in supporting our adult students and the children to learn more about bias, how it impacts our teaching, our educational system and families – and then take some actionable steps to show our local community how committed we are to supporting equity within our program."

Nadiyah Taylor has been in the early care and education field since 1994, in a variety of roles including preschool teacher, parent educator, and diversity consultant. She is the chair of the early care and education program. Her consulting work, The Ripple Effect, focuses on the continuing need for the inclusion of anti-bias principles in early childhood settings and childrearing. Educational equity and social justice are key themes of her work.
