On Wednesday, October 20, the LPC Asian American Pacific Islander (AAPI) Learning Community Interest Group hosted an Afghan Student Panel Event, which consisted of students from Las Positas College and Chabot College. A total of 45 people attended the event. The panelists' conversation was expertly led by LPC students, Jackie Carrillo and Omar Omar. The student panelists were Nargis Azizpor, Ghazaal Hamid, and Omar Omar, all of whom spoke about their Afghan heritage, college experiences, and how the crisis in Afghanistan has affected them, their families, and their communities. Special guest, Mallory De Lauro, the District Chief of Staff & Foreign Affairs Advisor to Congressman Eric Swalwell, also shared her expertise with attendees. Her passion for and commitment to helping Afghan Communities in Congressional District 15 are inspiring. It was a moving event in which participants - student panelists, Ms. De Lauro, and attendees - shared their personal stories and feelings about the past and present situation in Afghanistan and the Afghan refugees who have fled their conflicted country to seek safety and support in the United States.

Dean of Arts and Humanities, Amy Mattern said of the event, "Thank you for bringing meaningful events and activities

to the (LPC) campus, and for your care, compassion, and advocacy for the AAPI community. And, ditto to Chabot's Asian Pacific Islander Education Association (APIEA). Another great LPC and Chabot collaboration."

Guided Pathways: Communities of Practice

This is a busy year for Guided Pathways! The college has engaged in many meaningful discussions and conversations to reflect on, as the college starts to define and develop Student Success Teams for Las Positas College. A Student Success Team is part of a campus-wide support system focused on partnering with students through the implementation of data-informed, equityinfused practices to support student's personal and academic success.

Although the college is not quite sure what Student Success Teams will look like yet as there is a need to gather information, we do know that success teams can enhance the overall student experience in Academic and Career Pathways and could include



individuals such as: Peer Mentors, Classified Professionals, Counseling Faculty, Instructional Faculty, and Administrators.

Las Positas College is in need of a holistic approach in which the support structures can be implemented at scale for all of our students and the approach needs to be a strategic, sustainable, and proactive so that the college can ensure each student receives the information, assistance and encouragement they need along their entire LPC journey from application to graduation. Therefore, members of the college community have engaged in a monthly Student Success Team Community of Practice to collaboratively develop Student Success Teams that will honor our LPC culture and strengths.

A Community of Practice, or CoP for short, is a group of people who share a common concern, a set of problems or interest in a topic and who come together to fulfill the goals of the group. The Guided Pathways CoP is a big part of what will drive the rollout for Success Teams! The college is taking this fall semester, with an equity and belonging focus, to learn from the expert practitioners and students on our campus and community to inform the creation and work of success teams at LPC so that it embraces our culture and enhances the student experience. The topics that have been a focus this semester include: Equity, Belonging, and Holistic Student Supports, Career and Community Engagement, and Networking. The CoP will continue during the Spring 2022 semester and will culminate in April and May, with a focus on designing the work of LPC's Student Success Teams to enhance our student experiences and increase the achievement and success for all of our students.
