- c. Public Safety Complex Mike McQuiston and Chad McMullen
- Approved bond \$950M
- Current Public Safety square footage approximately 9600, projected square footage 18,700. Doubling classroom space, adding a simulation lab, mat room, computer lab and a 7 story fire tower (to also be used by AJ for rappelling, forced entry)
- Compliment unmet community needs
- Looking at EVOC (Alan Hancock has a mile-long course), possible \$1.25M revenue stream
- Other agencies coming to LPC asking for space (SJ, ACSO). Looking into pooling resources with surrounding agencies
- May join the South Bay Consortium
- Jack Tucker Delta, SJ, PG&E all using ACSO EVOC, working instructors to the bone. Need LPC to make a commitment to build EVOC. POST student/instructor ratio can be expensive, also the college has a rule about how many instructors can be used.

- Mike McQuiston using public and private funds would mean it needs to be a community resource.
- Time Frames for Public Safety Complex RFPs are in, interview conducted for top 3 contenders in April, will go to the board in May. Time to build 3 -4 years.
- Want training facility to be built first. Vehicle bay and some other facilities may be shared with other disciplines/agencies.
- 7. Industry Updates Mike McQuiston Seeking input/ advice for the college to help meet industry needs.
- **a.** Paul Rolleri Is there a mental health / de-escalation class or information. Academies are covering mental health and de-escalation. Getting people to think about the subject matter.
 - Mike McQuiston LPC is incorporating mental health in the patrol procedures class; would like to expand to more than a week in a class; Oakland hosting a 40-hour CIT (Crisis Intervention Team).
 - Jack Tucker ACSO is wrestling with mental health, homelessness and substance abuse, as well as how to interface with John George Psychiatric Hospital (Fire issue not a criminal issue) and Falck Ambulance. A lot of de-escalation information coming in to ACSO, it takes 2 officers to de-escalate. Issue of officers not remembering training in the moment. Training helps with faster reactions. Officer safety may be a way to get more training in de-escalation. Mental health is going to be more of an issue going forward.
 - Paul Rolleri The Fire Department in the city of Alameda see mental health as a revenue stream. There are many homeless encampments. No one wants to criminalize mental health, but police are called.
 - Mike Harris Using time and distance to de-escalate. Sometimes the best action is to walk away.
- **8.** Training Needs Jack Tucker Marijuana use, tell students not to use it. DUI POST guidelines. **Mike** McQuiston Information on marijuana included in the Ethics class.
- **9. Hiring Needs Mike McQuiston, Jack Tucker –** Need a push on physical fitness; Program emphasis on physical fitness, character and writing and academics.
 - Mike Harris Start recruiting early. Opportunity to guest speak in AJ classes. Mike McQuiston LPC opportunities: guest speaking, Majors Fair, SMART Shop- Choosing Public Safety, Youth Academy, ROP
 - **Jack Tucker, Mike Harris and Paul Rolleri** recruit in Alameda quit after 2 weeks, 6 of 7 new recruits from the 162nd Academy quit in Sunnyvale. Had one recruit quit in Livermore.
- 10. Industry Outlook Chad McMullen, Jack Tucker, Paul Rolleri, John Geissberger Are veterans pulling the plug after 10-15 years/ Not at ACSO because they are too invested; People are walking away after 10-15 years to do something else or because they can't afford to live in the East Bay; veterans going to more affordable, safer communities like Fairfield, CO and ID.

- **12. Recommendations of the Advisory Board Paul Rolleri –** recommends incorporating CIT and mental health into the curriculum.
 - Jack Tucker get speakers on mental health i.e. CARD; Pre-academy program, students who complete a preacademy program are more successful.
 - Gena Steward create a class with mental health, officer safety, preparation for interaction with the public, preparation on how to get hired
 - Mike McQuiston Make a class like the one Gena suggested a requirement for the AA degree? During the day not all AJ students want to be police officers so the class might be hard to fill.
