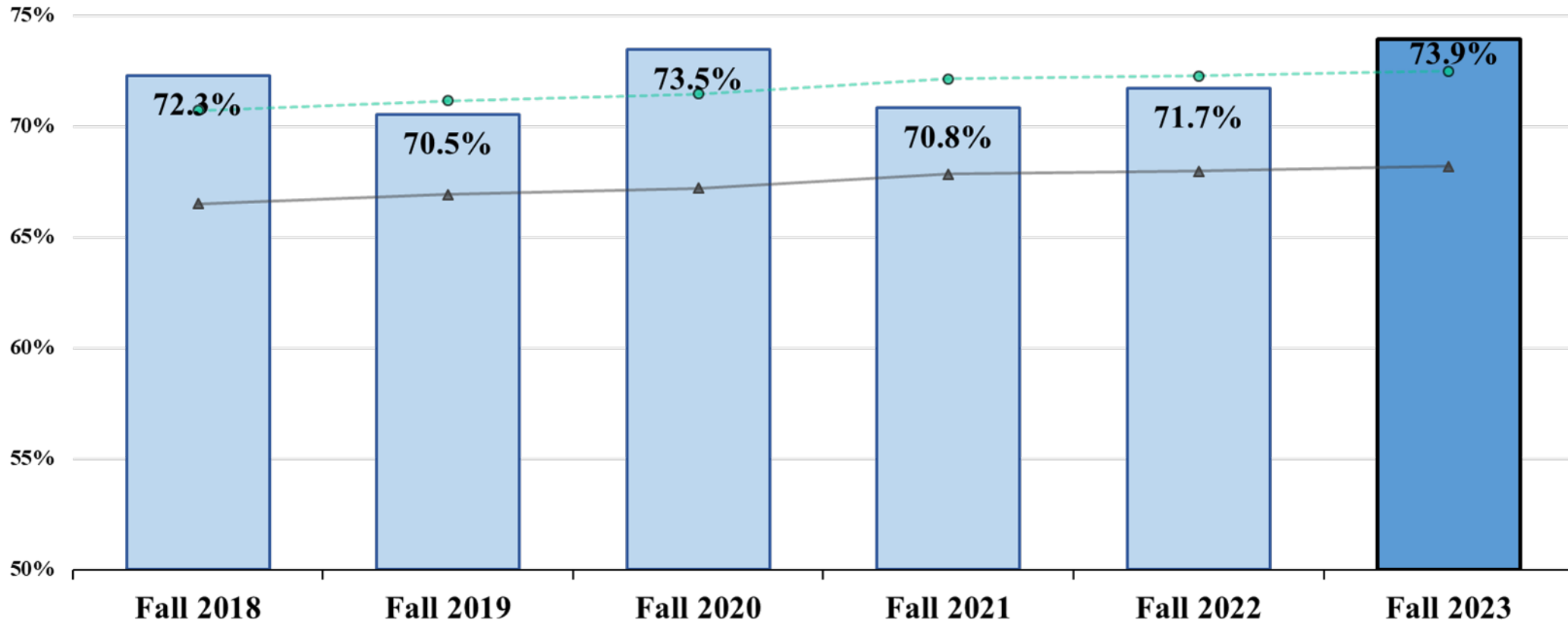

—▲— Institution-Set Standard (95%) -●- Stretch Goal (101%)

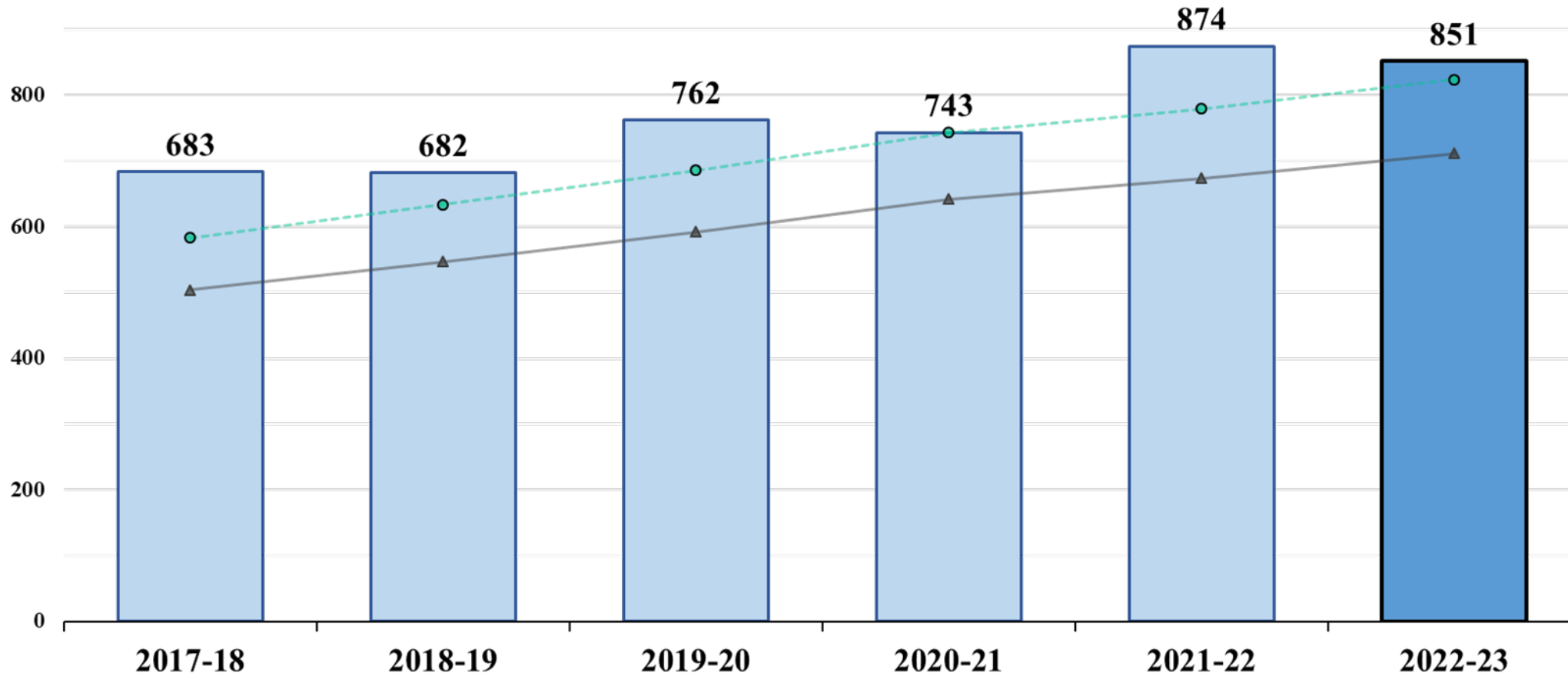




LPC Degree Completions (unduplicated)

—▲— Institution-Set Standard (95%)

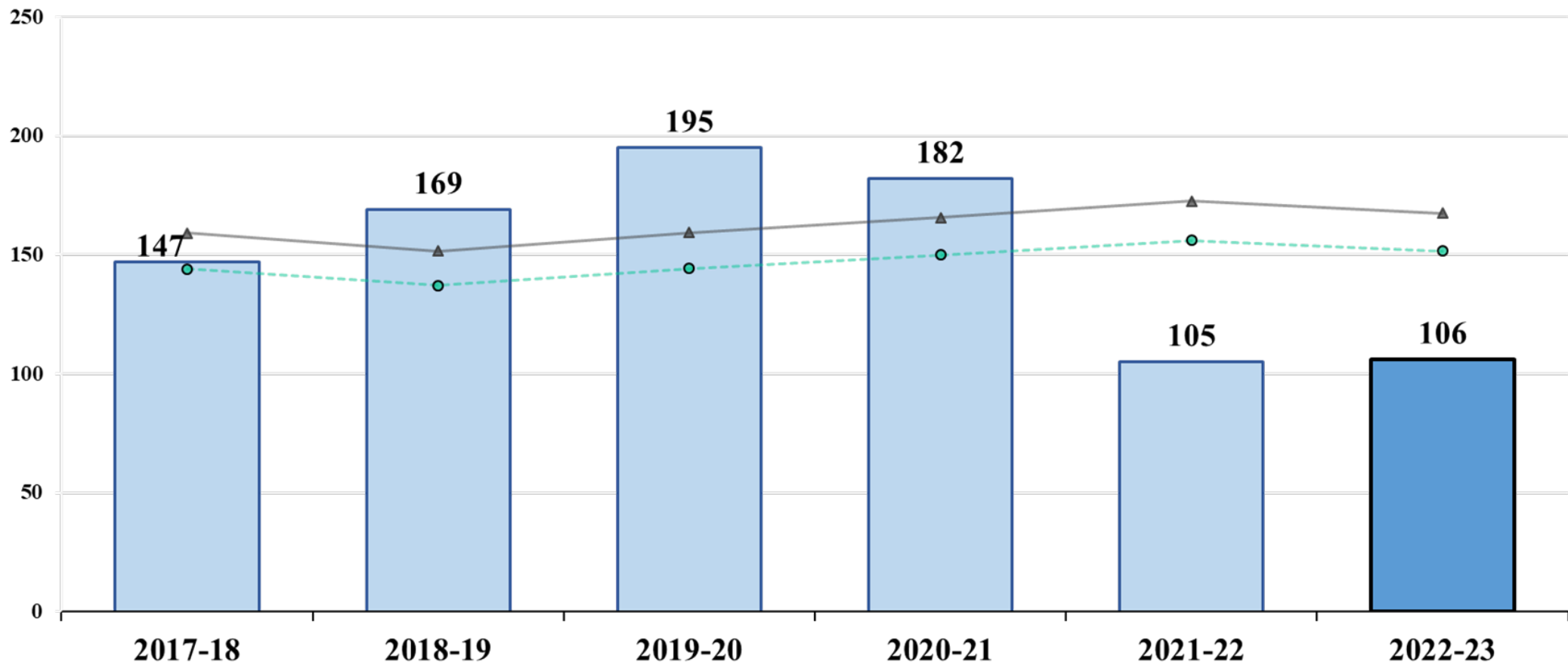

—●— Institution-Set Standard (95%) —▲— Stretch Goal (105%)

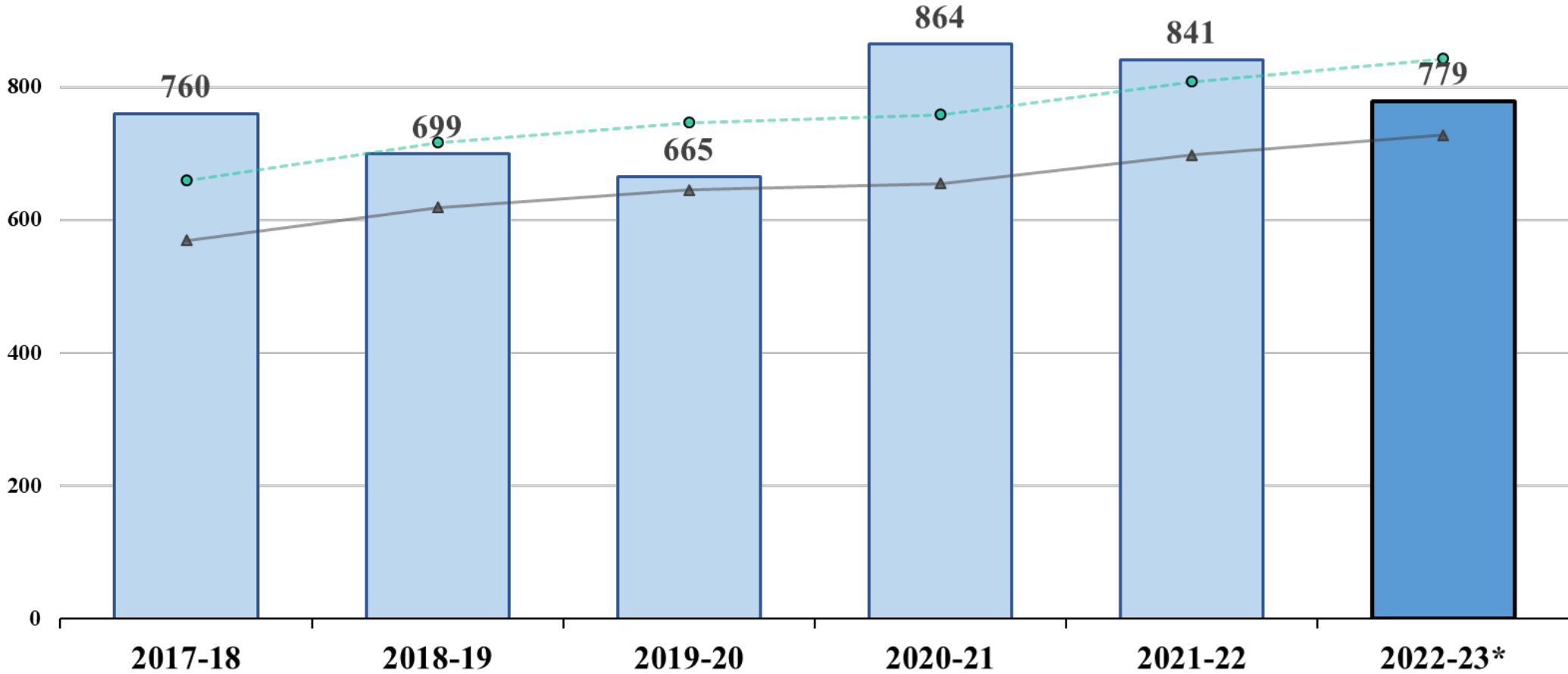




LPC Transfer Completions (unduplicated)

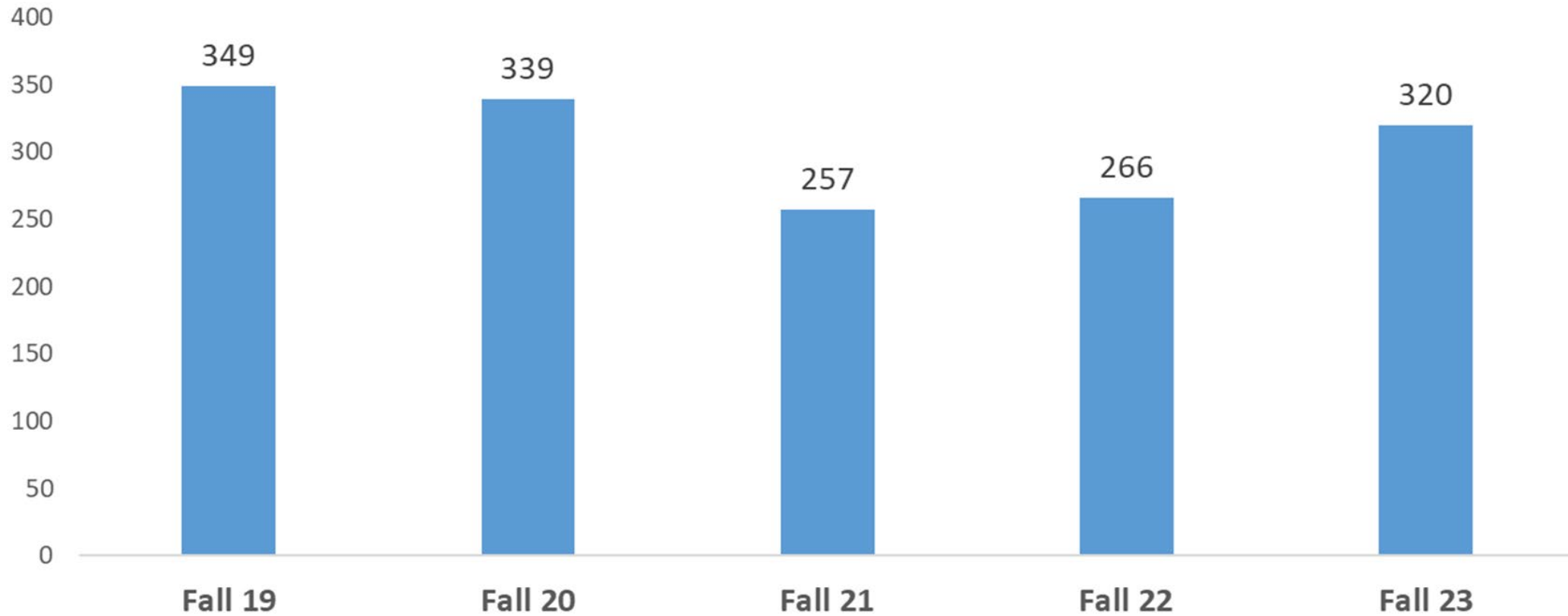

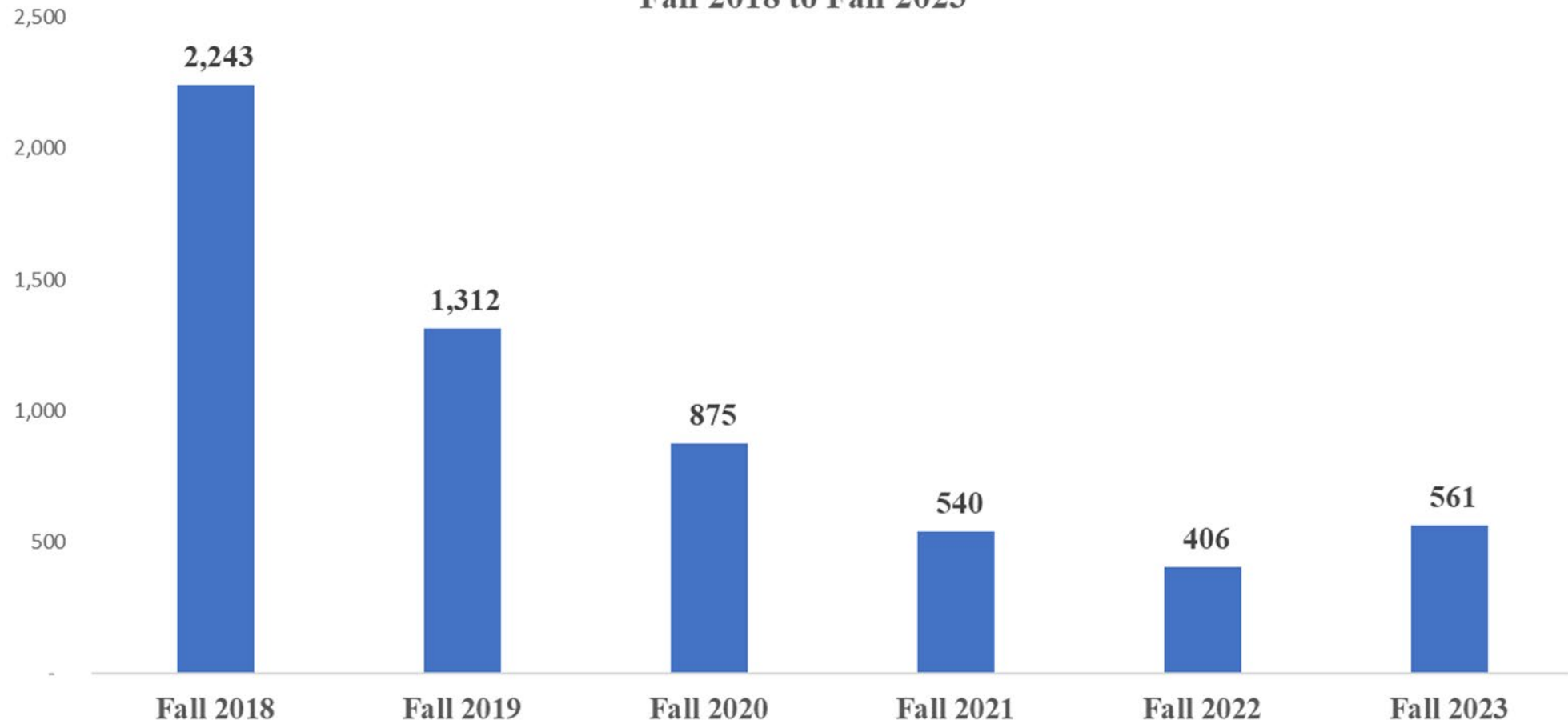

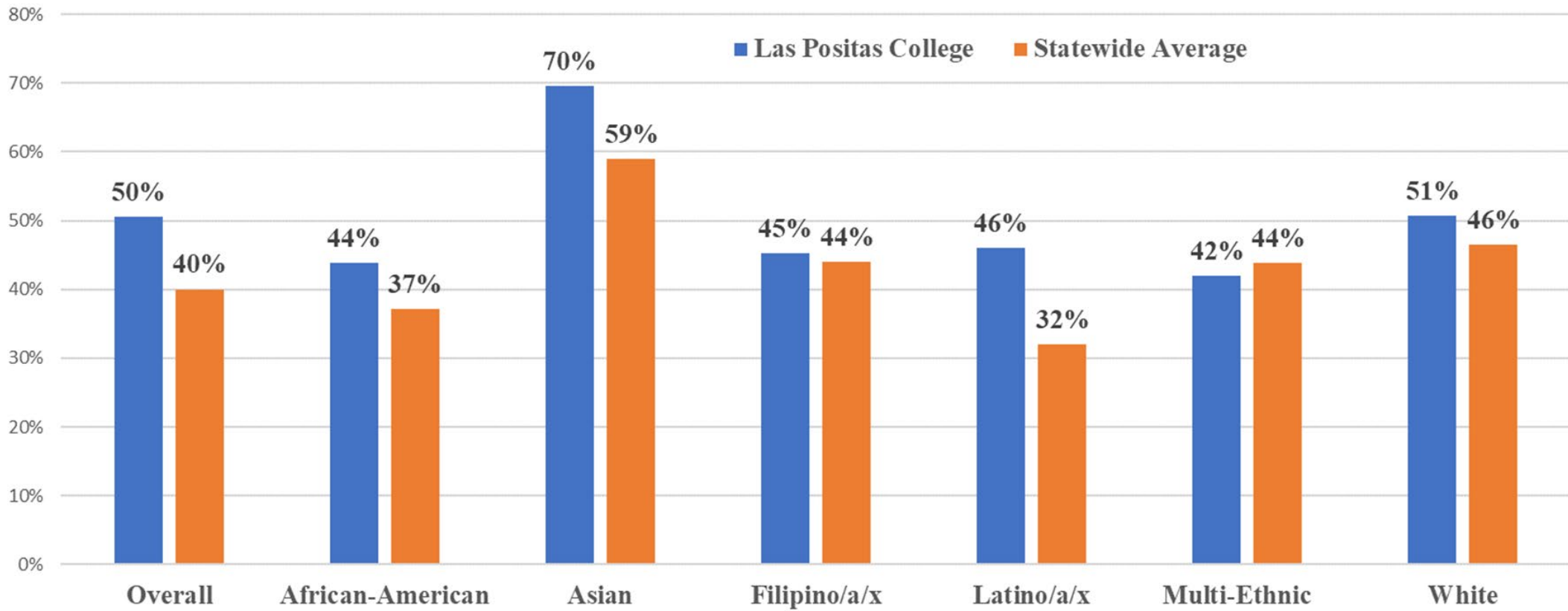


Ensure excellence in student learning by prioritizing equity and anti-racism

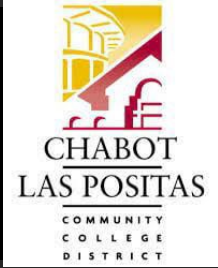

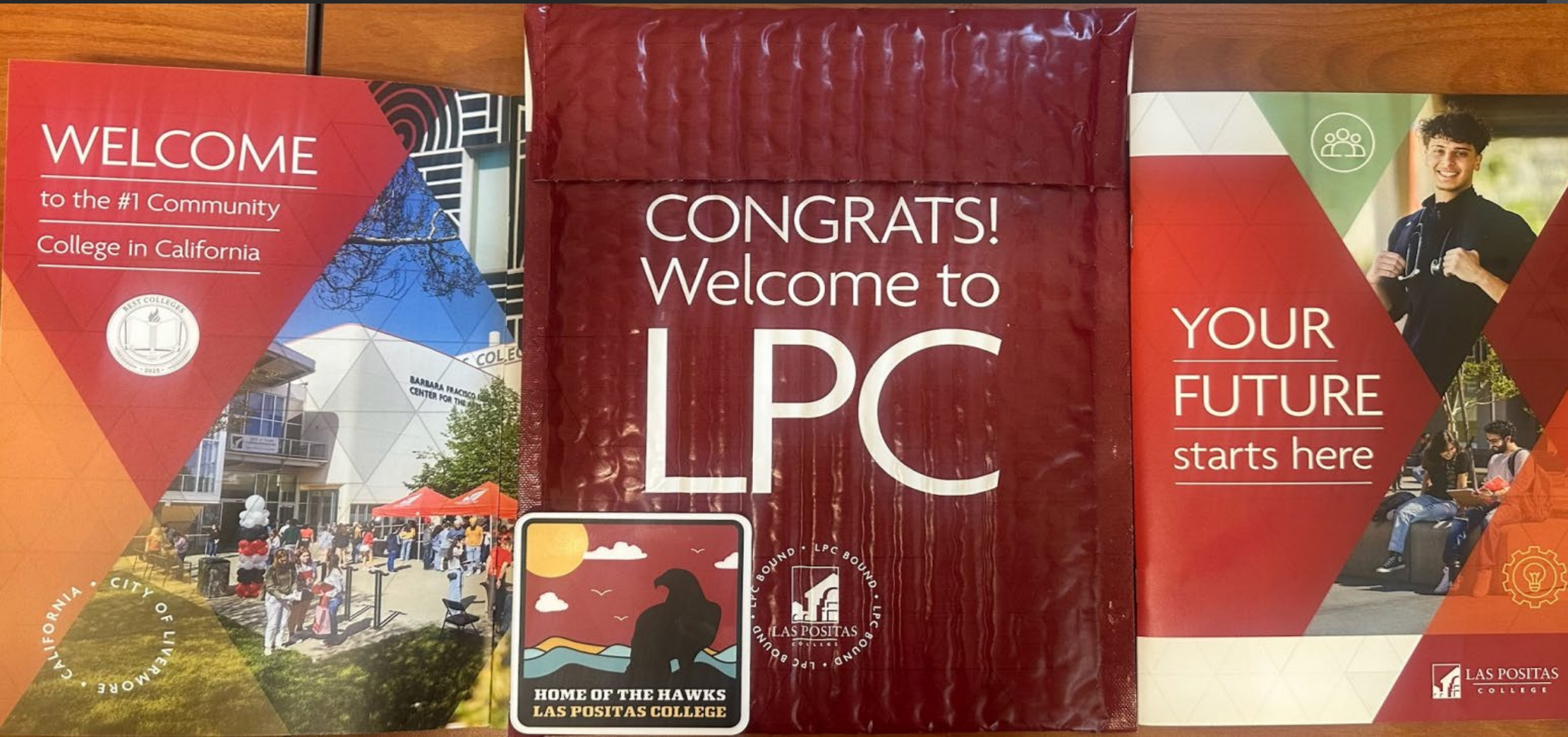

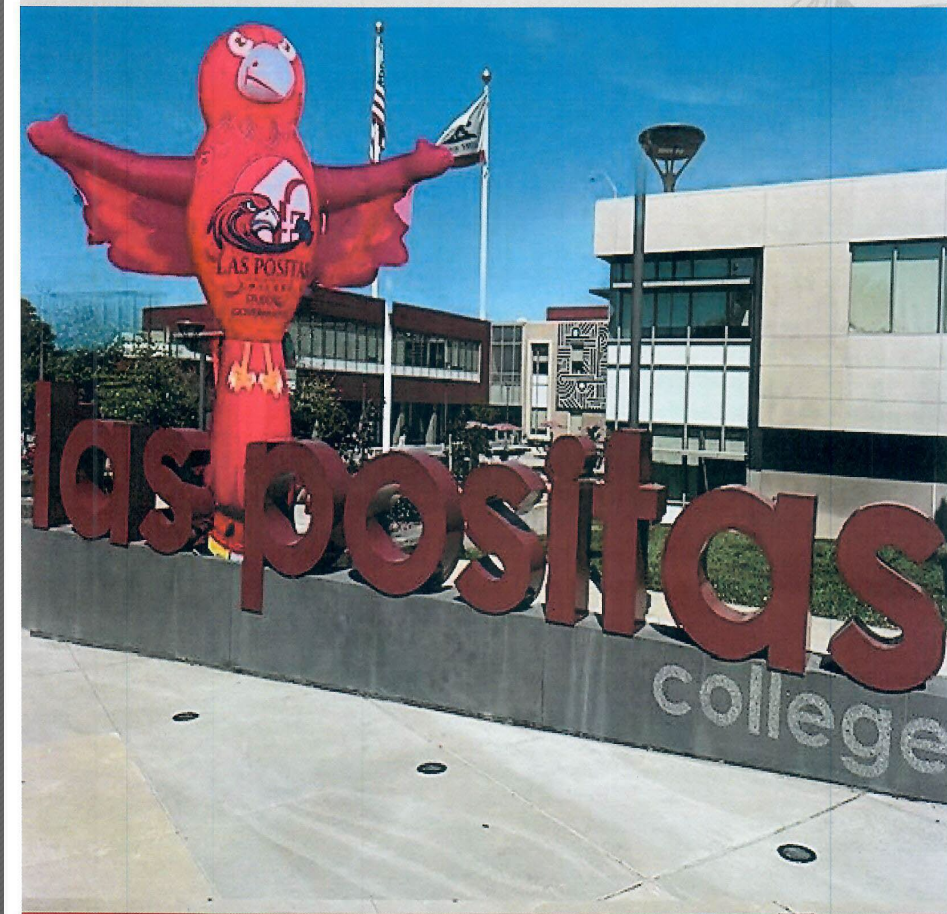

California FY 2024-25 Budget



State Budget Overview – The Latest

- June 26, 2024 - Governor Newsom signed the Budget Act of 2024
 - Budget reflects state expenditures of approximately \$298 billion
- Key features
 - \$298 billion funding level represents a 4.2% decrease (i.e. \$13 billion) from the 23-24 enacted budget
 - 24-25 California Community College Budget focuses on stability – No major core reductions to programs or services (utilization of reserves and operational savings)
 - Budget includes approximately \$143 million in ongoing adjustments to the Student Centered Funding Formula (SCFF), of which \$100 million is for a 1.07% cost of living adjustment (COLA) (COLA is above the initial 0.76% projection)

California FY 2024-25 Budget



State Budget Overview – The Latest

- Overall budget reflects lower revenues and substantial budget deficit
 - \$45 billion estimated 24-25 budget deficit
 - \$30 billion expected 25-26 budget deficit

Hold Harmless and Multi-Year Planning



- Revenue protection for districts through FY 2024-25
- Beginning in FY 2025-26, districts who do not generate funding through the SCFF greater than their FY 2024-25 revenue floor, would no longer be given cumulative COLAs
- The budget for FY 2024-25 is being developed with a plan for continued enrollment growth in subsequent years; the ultimate goal is to have the District be funded from the SCFF calculation and no longer rely on the hold harmless provision

Next Steps



- Budget Adoption
 - Will incorporate the enacted State Budget figures and will be presented to the Board on September 10 prior to the September 15 Budget Adoption deadline
- The District & Las Positas College will continue to monitor any significant developments that occur between now and approval of the proposed Adopted Budget

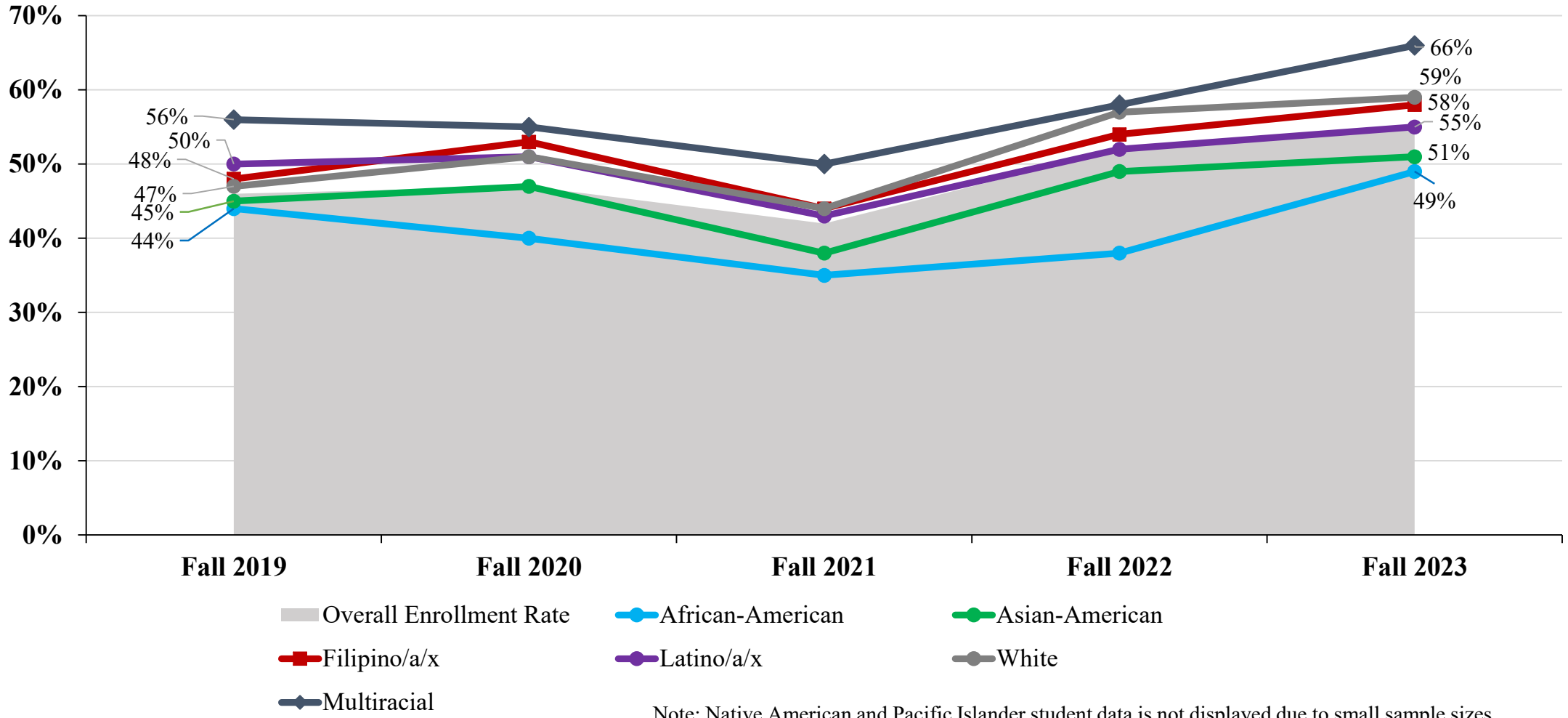

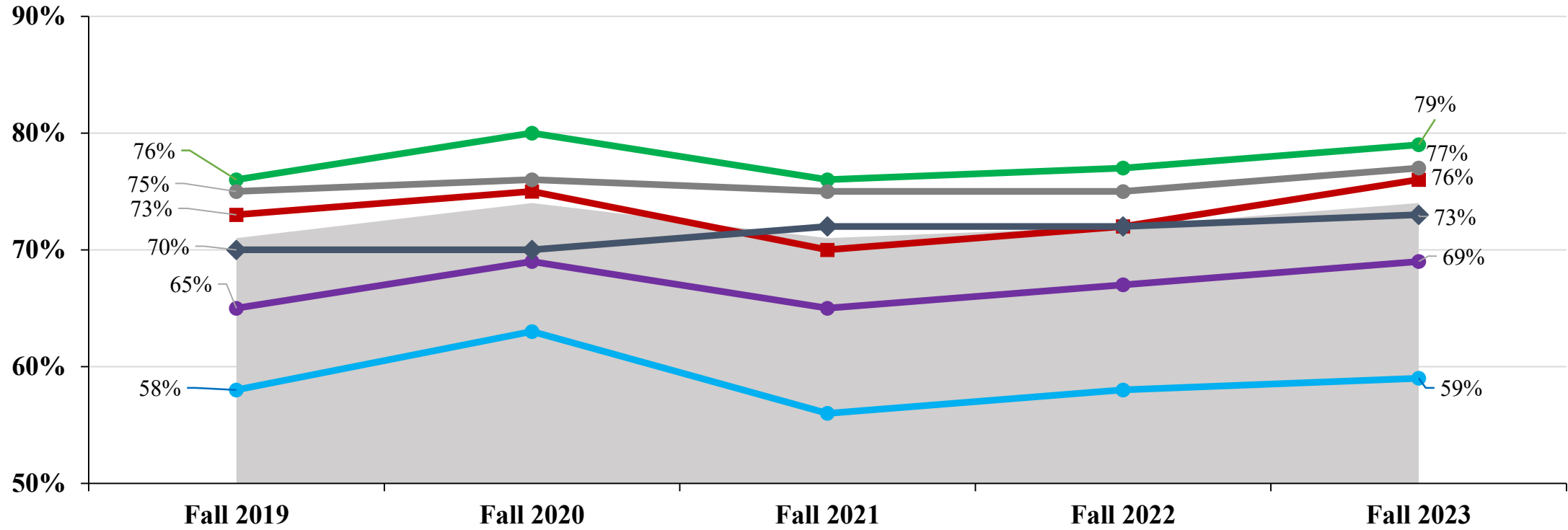
Enrollment Rates of Applicants (Access)

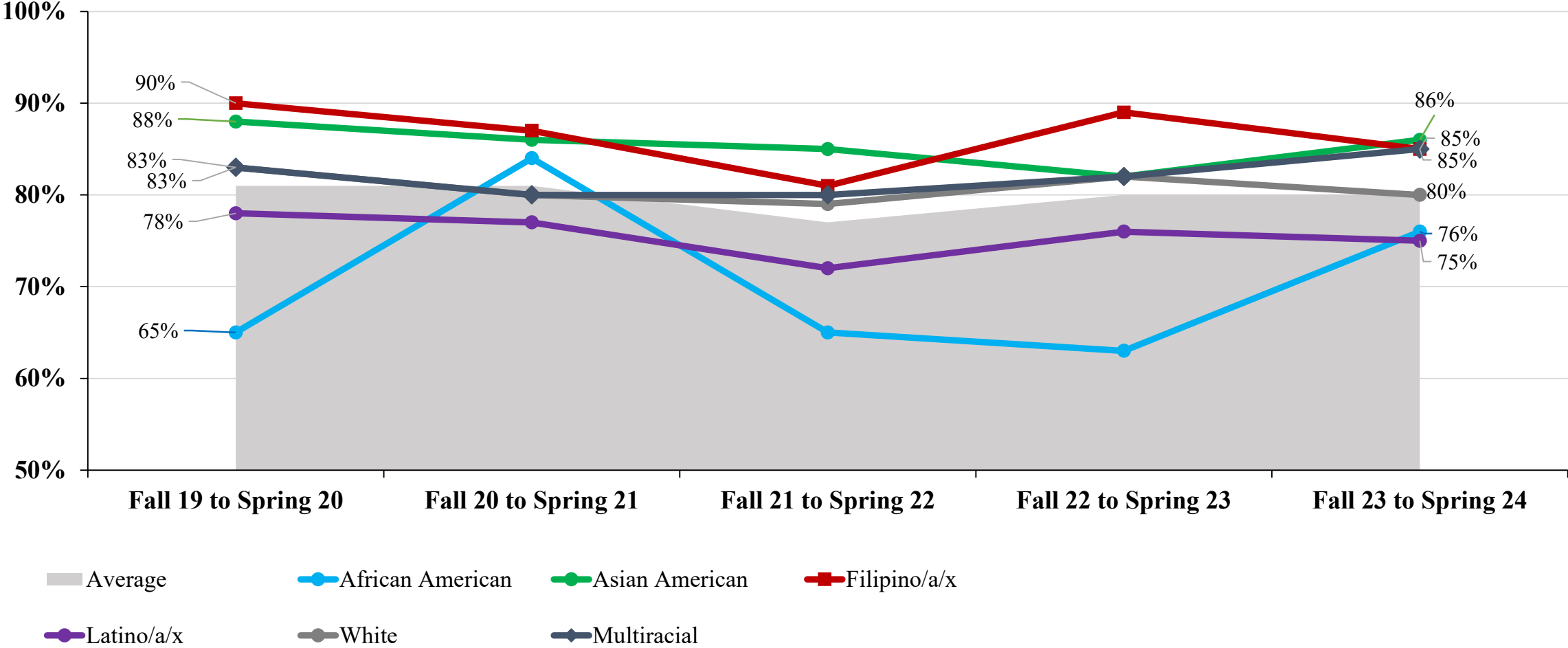

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Day 1 Lesson Plan

- What: Researchers have explored the impact of building rapport on student learning and have concluded the benefits include:
 - Better understanding of the audience on the part of the instructor
 - Increased student engagement in the course content, leading to enhanced learning
 - Greater student comfort with expressing their thoughts in or out of class
 - The feeling among students that they are valued, which makes them more willing to be intellectually challenged by the instructor
 - The creation of a mutually beneficial and exciting learning environment
- Question to answer: How can I structure Day 1 (or Day 0) of the class to create a collaborative learning environment?

Equitable Assessment and Grading

- What: Equitable assessments and grading practices emphasize the process of learning versus performance outcome and grades. Some characteristics of equitable assessments and grading practices include:
 - Aligns to course goals and learning objectives
 - Respects student diversity
 - Incorporates flexibility and choice
 - Monitors progress
 - Provides feedback
 - Allows for failure through multiple attempts
- Question to answer: How can I revise my course or assignment grading rubrics to empower and motivate students?

- What: Inclusive language is a key part of building a community that respects the diversity of our students in the classroom. All written content should be free from words, phrases or tones that are offensive and/or exclude people based on their identities. Inclusive language can be incorporated in:
 - Syllabus
 - Course assignment instructions
 - Canvas announcements
- Question to answer: How can I edit my course syllabus to include words, phrases and tones that are welcoming to all students?

Course Modification: HEA 7 - Introduction to Public Health

Address

Measurable objective language is inclusive. Objectives illustrate how the course will equip and empower students to learn, apply and use skills to advance health equity and reduce health disparities in their communities and within the field of public health.

- Course Content

Address

Course content provides students with multiple opportunities for reflection. Content specifically covers the social determinants of health, and how the inequitable distribution of resources leads to health disparities. Material representing varying viewpoints is integrated into the course content. For example, when presenting recent research on the shortening lifespan of White Americans, the long standing shorter life expectancy of Black Americans is also presented.
