


Course Success Rates




Deficit-Mindedness

Explanations for inequities that are typically grounded in what racially minoritized groups *lack*

By focusing on the *perceived shortcomings* of racially minoritized groups, the role of systemic and structural barriers to equity are more easily ignored








All-Student Centeredness

Explanations for inequity are *race-neutral* and don't consider the impact of race on learning experience, challenges faced, etc.

Assumes institutional responsibility for problem, but solutions focus **on students' deficiencies,** and the role of systemic and structural barriers to equity are not addressed





Equity-Mindedness

Explanations for inequity are *race-conscious* and focus on how institution contributes to gaps

Assumes institutional responsibility for problem, and solutions reflect fundamental changes in the college's policies, practices, structures, and/or culture

Importance of Equity-Minded Data Sensemaking

- Reveal hidden patterns of inequity
- Refocuses dialogue to factors within our sphere of control
- Initiatives critical (self) reflection of current practices, programs, policies, structures, culture
- Informs equity-minded solutions that eliminate gaps
- Provides practitioners agency to address gaps



The Power of Reframing Our Response to Equity Data...

Students, especially Black male students, do not utilize the Math Lab (tutoring). They don't seek help. Is our communication and marketing about the Math Lab effective in reaching our Black students?

We don't do enough advertising for the Math Lab services.



Practice in Pairs: Reframe One or More of These Deficit-Minded Statements into an Equity-Minded One

Many of our Latine/x students come from underperforming high schools. They are unprepared for college. Our Latine/x students work too many hours... they don't have time to study... they aren't engaged

Black students are less interested in STEM careers than other students Asian students are harder to get to know because they are quiet in class



Within the context of recent federal immigration enforcement measures



Sanctuary District/Sanctuary Campus

On December 5, 2017, the CLPCCD Board of Trustees adopted a resolution by the Las Positas College Academic Senate, Classified Senate, and Associated Students requesting that Las Positas College be designated as a sanctuary campus.

Assembly Bill 21 – Access to Higher Education

Districts/Colleges must:

- Identify a single point of contact when US Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) agents are on campus
- Protect personal information of students and employees
- Notify emergency contact if student or employee is taken into custody
 - Ensure your contact information is current with Human Resources



Assembly Bill 21 – Access to Higher Education

The college (employer) cannot permit immigration agents to:

• Enter non-public areas of the worksite without a warrant

In the context of protected areas, areas open to the public such as lobbies, waiting areas, outdoor areas and parking lots are considered public areas, while interior areas, offices, and those marked "private" with a sign are considered private (non-public).



LPC Campus Safety & Security Officers are committed to the safety and well-being of all of our students and employees.

California Values Act

- Prohibits engaging in activities in connection with immigration enforcement
- including: investigating, interrogating, or detaining for immigration enforcement purposes



Responding to On-Campus Immigration Enforcement Activities:

- **NOTIFY:** The President's Office (ext. 1001) immediately if you are aware of immigration activities on or around campus
- **ADVISE:** Immigration Enforcement Agents that you are not authorized to accept warrants
- **DIRECT:** Students & colleagues away from Agents into private offices/work areas
- **ESCORT:** Immigration Enforcement Agents to the President's Office or contact Campus Safety (ext. 1690) to escort the Agents to the President's Office



Responding to On-Campus Immigration Enforcement Activities:

- Do not allow or provide consent for agents to access to non-public space (personal offices, work areas, or classrooms)
- Do not disclose any personal information of a student or employee
- Everyone has the right to remain silent





California FY 2025-26 Budget



- State Budget Overview Governor's January Budget
 - January 10, 2025 Governor Newsom released his budget proposal for the 2025-26 fiscal year
 - CA State Budget is \$322.2 billion, up by approximately 8% from FY 24-25
 - Budget reflects state expenditures of approximately \$298 billion
 - COLA for Community Colleges will be 2.43%
 - COLA of 2.43% also applied to categorical programs such as Adult ED, EOPS, DSPS, Cal Works, Block Grant, Apprenticeships, CARE, and Childcare Tax Bailout
 - Base increase of \$30 million to Rising Scholars
 - Proposed FY 25-26 is balanced with a modest projected surplus of \$363 million. It projects \$16.5 billion in revenues above expectation in the 2024 Budget Act related to a stronger stock market, savings from elimination of 6,500 state government positions, along with operational efficiencies.
 - Concerns
 - Deferred Maintenance
 - Nursing Shortages how to fund with reduction in strong workforce
 - Forecast Developed before January 7 Los Angeles Wildfires
 - August 2024 College Day Projections were:
 - \$30 billion expected 25-26 budget deficit

Macro Economic Conditions



• Tariffs

- Price of imported goods increase, direct impact to consumer
- Higher cost for US Companies to export goods due to anticipated retaliatory tariffs
- Less competition
- Result Reduction in Gross Domestic Product ("GDP")
 - GDP is the total monetary value of all the finished goods and services produced within a country in a specific time period
 - A way to measure the economic health of a country or region
- Immigration
 - Reduces overall US workforce
 - Food prices will increase
- Other economic conditions
 - Gas prices are projected to increase
 - Interest rates will remain high
