In Memoriam: Bill Paskewitz

LPC mourns the loss of beloved Art Instructor Bill Paskewitz who passed away unexpectedly at the age of 61 on November 20th.

"His students loved him," said President Russell. "He was a fantastic teacher and will be greatly missed." Students were known to register as soon as possible to make sure they got a spot in his popular art classes.

In October, Mr. Paskewitz organized the "We Can" art show to benefit the Alameda County Food Bank. He told the student newspaper, *The Express*, that he wanted to give back to the community "as a thank you for letting me have a wonderful 28 years here teaching." He had planned to retire in June 2015.

Grief counseling is available at LPC through the Health Center (925) 424-1831 and Counselor Jill Oliveira (925) 424-1596. Funeral services were held on November 29th. Mr. Paskewitz's family invited the entire campus community to a reception at Mr. Paskewitz's home following the funeral.
