LPC Foundation 2021 Highlights

Fundraising In Support of COVID-19 Related Student Needs

Thanks to the generosity of the Las Positas College community, the Las Positas College Foundation was able to raise over \$12,000 in support of COVID-19 related student needs. The challenges of remote and hybrid learning meant finding ways to help our students continue their studies and provide critical tools and resources. With these funds, the LPC Foundation was able to purchase more than 20 Wi-Fi hotspots with a year of internet service for students who needed a way to connect to the web for remote learning, as well as 9 sewing machines for costume design students in the LPC

Theater Program.



\$20,000 Gift Establishes New Scholarship for First Responders

Las Positas College students majoring in one of twelve areas of study are eligible to apply for the new "Promising First Responders" Scholarship. Established by Ms. Patricia Wheeler, long-time LPC supporter, this award will provide two \$1,000 and two \$500 scholarships to students who meet the application criteria.

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2021 Student Scholarships Awarded

This year, the LPC Foundation proudly awarded over \$330,000 in scholarships to more than 75 deserving students. Our generous donors continue to invest in their success through a wide range of scholarships, including support for students transferring to 4-year institutions, re-entering college after a lapse in attendance, training for a new career, veterans, Performing Arts majors and many more.

The Foundation, in partnership with the LPC Financial Aid Office, are preparing to open the 2022 scholarship application portal. Once again, over \$300,000 in funds will be available.

President Speaker Series Presents: Dr. Maisha Beasley

Dr. Maisha Beasley, a Livermore native, graduated from San Diego State University with a B.A. in Communication Studies, University of the Pacific with a M.A. in Higher Education Administration, and from University of San Francisco with an Ed.D. in International and Multicultural Education.



For over 20 years, Dr. Beasley has curated professional career building sustainable programming for colleges, universities, school districts, and small businesses. Her professional experiences also include working in the educational technology field building online orientation courses for new graduate students with universities across the country. These experiences led Dr. Beasley to steep her passion, education, and experiences into serving the intersections of her communities through consulting.

Dr. Beasley and her co-founder Ashley Carter created the African American Scholars Project which provides African American students in suburban communities with social, emotional, and college preparation skills. This program was recognized by the California State Board Association for their work in equity and access within the Livermore Valley Joint Unified School District. In addition to program management and consulting, Maisha co-authored a chapter of the book, Cases on Academic Program Redesign for Greater Racial and Social Justice titled "Make Space, Take Space: An Exploration of Academic Counter-Spaces for Black Collegiate Women".

LPC Alum Wins HBCU Competition

In November 2021, Inglish Hills an LPC alum, competed and won The Bearway Capital's Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCU) New Venture Challenge inaugural business plan competition. She will receive \$25,000 in seed money and continuous mentoring for Save Cycle, her inventive company that puts a spin on traditional recycling for consumers and repurposes the materials handling process. Save Cycle is a company that integrates a mobile phone app with low-energy recycling devices. The consumer would deposit the recyclables and scan the QR code to obtain instant funds that are deposited to their bank account, making recycling easy, convenient, and accessible.



Inglish is an alum of Las Positas College where she received an associate's degree in criminal justice administration. She was also the president of the Black Student Un-

ion and transferred to Spellman College in the Fall of 2019. She is currently in her senior year at Spellman College majoring in sociology on the pre-law track.

Memorandum Approved for Base 11

The Center for Innovation in Education, dba Base 11, is a STEM workforce and entrepreneur accelerator. Both Base 11 and Las Positas College have a mutual goal to empower and accelerate diverse students, entrepreneurs, and early career adults on their pathway to STEM career success.



Base 11's Next Frontier Industries include advanced manufacturing, cyber security, life sciences, medicine and healthcare, data analytics, and autonomous systems just to name a few. These industries are some of the fastest growing and most rewarding over the next 20 years. The memorandum of understanding (MOU) will allow Las Positas College to collaborate with Base 11 on opportunities for integration of programs for students, opportunities to network and collaborate with corporate sponsors and other Base 11 partners, and provide students access to career opportunities and resources. In the October 2021 board meeting the Board of Trustees approved a five year MOU with Base 11.

Two Collaborative Grants Awarded

Two grant applications that were submitted in collaboration with Tri-Valley ROP have been awarded. The first grant titled, "Building Capacity Through Work-Based Learning Advisory Board, and Externships" was awarded at \$679,968.

The second grant titled, "Summer Camps Provide College and Career Preparation" was awarded at \$529,899 for a grant total of \$1.2M.
